WELCOME. In the name of Christ, we offer you welcome to this church. THE SERVICE. There are two main books used for our service; the smaller red book is the *Book of Common Prayer* and the larger blue book is the *Hymnal*. There is also a *Gray Hymnal*. They can be found in the bookrack on the back of the pew in front of you. A *Bible* can be found at the ends of the pew. The page / hymn numbers in the service bulletin help you find your place in these service books. We invite you to participate fully in our worship.

RECEIVING COMMUNION. Holy Communion in the Episcopal Church is open to all who are comfortable participating in the Communion of the Lords' Table. To receive communion, please form two lines in the center aisle and approach the front of the Celebration Altar.

Please stand with one hand cupped on top of the other to receive the consecrated bread from the Celebrant. Then step to the side to the Eucharistic Minister and **take** the chalice and drink from it; or you may intinct the bread by dipping it in the consecrated wine. If you do not wish to receive Holy Communion, please come forward for a blessing (fold your arms across your chest to indicate that you do not wish to receive Holy Communion). Return to your pew by way of the side aisles.

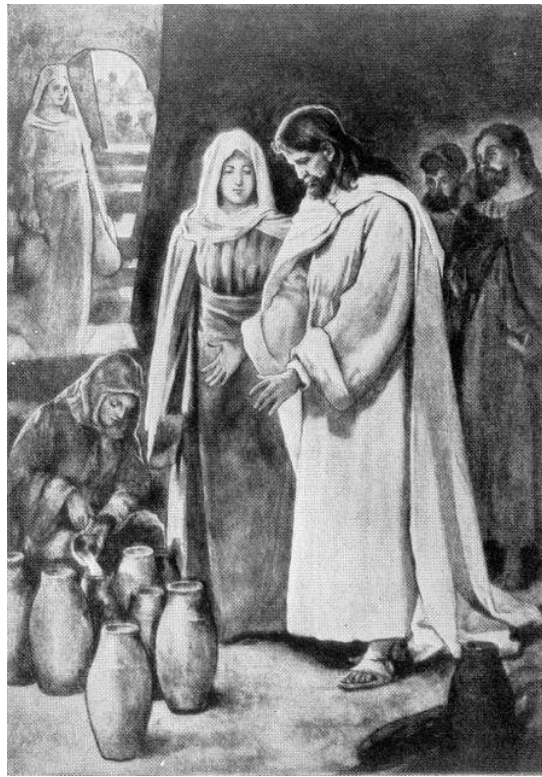

For January

It was not the best of years, the one that steps now into memory, but we can leave that in the care of the ancestors, to sort out and put right, while we walk on to see what tomorrow brings, a new chance to use what we have learned. May you find what you seek. May your healing be complete. May you discover your place to be. Time is only a line drawn in sand. Life is a spirit flying in starlight. When you cross from one to the other, do not look back, but fix your heart on the light you see, rising to meet you on a familiar horizon.

Solemn Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul: We will celebrate our Patronal Feast – The Conversion of Saint Paul – on Monday, January 28. There will be a Solemn Festive Eucharist at 7:00 p.m. in the Church. This will be a joint Episcopal / Lutheran Eucharist with Pastor Beth Costlow of Saint John Lutheran and Chaplain Dione Klepetka, Saint John Herr Estate Retirement Community as concelebrants. Father Patrick will be the primary celebrant. During this service, we will recognize the new members of the Saint Paul Sages Society – which are those of our family who have turned 80 during the past year. Come celebrate the mission and ministry of Saint Paul – the person and this parish – and all that the future holds for us. Come celebrate our “wise foundation” – our “rocks” who are the foundation of this parish family and who have helped make Saint Paul what it is today.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: Each year, Christians the world over pray for unity among Christian churches and denominations. At the Last Supper Jesus prayed that we would be one even as Jesus and the Father are one. Unity among churches does not necessarily mean a unity of organizational structure (since Jesus did not leave a blueprint or organizational chart of the church with the Apostles, he could not have prayed for that). The unity that exists between the Father and Jesus was a unity of mind and heart – of reason and love. This year the week of Christian Unity begins on Friday, January 18 (The Feast of the Confession of Saint Peter) and ends on Friday, January 25 (The Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul). We will have one service to celebrate this Week of Christian Unity. The service will be Solemn Evening Prayer on Tuesday, January 22 at Saint Paul Episcopal Church beginning at 7:00 p.m. This service will be a joint celebration of prayer and praise of Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church, Saint Paul Episcopal Church, and Saint Peter Roman Catholic Church. Father Patrick will be the main celebrant with Father Kelley, Pastor of Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church assisting and Jeff Baylor, Deacon of Saint Peter Roman Catholic Church preaching.

Use of St. Paul's Facilities: Please call the Parish Office if you want to reserve the Parish Hall or Church.

Reminder: Please remember that when you use the Parish Hall nothing can be put on the walls or the woodwork. Using scotch tape, duct tape, masking tape, and even some types of painter's tape has the possibility of pulling the paint off the wall or damaging the surface. Items can only be placed on the wooden food bank cabinets or the metal kitchen window and its metal surround. Only masking tape or painter's tape can be used on these surfaces.
