We invite you to participate fully in our worship.

**RECEIVING COMMUNION.** Holy Communion in the Episcopal Church is open to all who are comfortable participating in the Communion of the Lords' Table. To receive communion, please form two lines in the center aisle and approach the front of the Celebration Altar.

Please stand with one hand cupped on top of the other to receive the consecrated bread from the Celebrant. Then step to the side to the Eucharistic Minister and **take** the chalice and drink from it; or you may intinct the bread by dipping it in the consecrated wine. If you do not wish to receive Holy Communion, please come forward for a blessing (fold your arms across your chest to indicate that you do not wish to receive Holy Communion). Return to your pew by way of the side aisles.

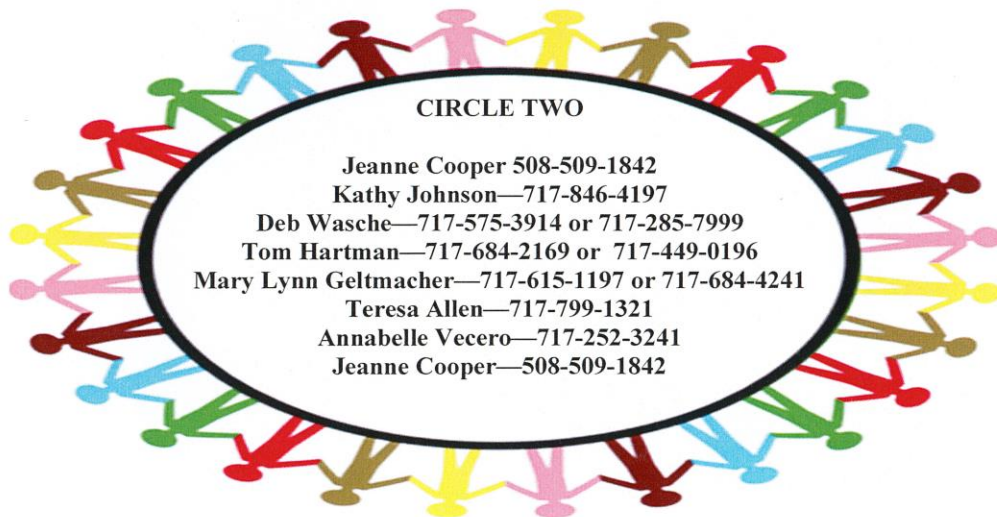
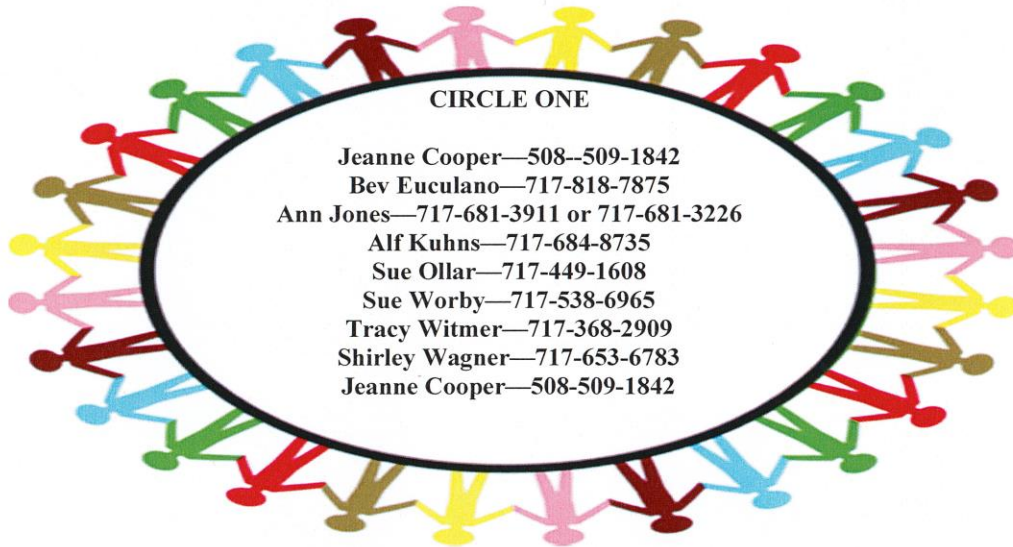

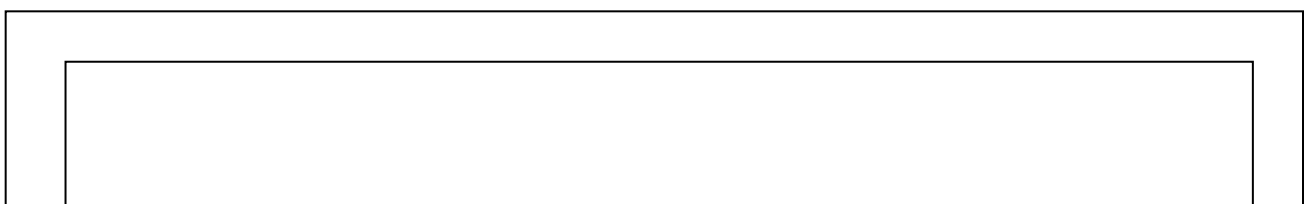

*A man who does a daily blog named Seth Godin recently wrote the following and I have to think this describes where Saint Paul is right now:*

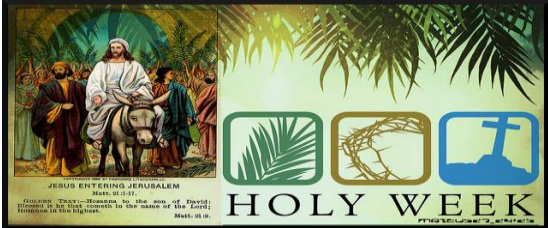
*There are two polar opposites: Staying Still and Breaking. It's easy to visualize each end of the axis, whatever the activity. In between is Stretching.*

### For March

Each person defines faith for themselves. We determine what it is and how it works. Even if we sit in the pews with a thousand others, we all still process what we believe individually. Part of that definition is received, imparted to us by culture and community. Part is internally developed over time and through experience. Faith, therefore, is a process. It is active within and exercised without as we encounter life. It can solidify or liquefy depending on the situation. Being conscious of what faith means to us is being aware of how life works for us. As Socrates is supposed to have said: the unexamined life is not worth living.

**Stations of the Cross:** On Friday, March 29 our brothers and sisters from Saint Peter Roman Catholic Church will join us here at Saint Paul beginning at 7:00 p.m. The Stations or Way of the Cross is a wonderful service that helps us walk with Jesus the incredibly painful way of the cross that he walked for us. Come and pray! This is a great service to bring a guest – just a simple song and prayer. “Could you not spend just one hour with me in prayer?”

**Palm/ Passion Sunday:** Palm / Passion Sunday is Sunday, April 14. We will begin our celebration with breakfast at The Columbia Presbyterian Church at 8:00 a.m. Following breakfast we will bless the palms and process to the church. The reading for the blessing of palms recounts Jesus’ entry into Jerusalem. Palms will be distributed as we begin the procession. Our Saturday evening service (April 13) will be held as regularly scheduled at 5:30 p.m. at the Saint John Herr Estate Chapel. The blessing distribution of the palms will take place at this service also.

**Maundy Thursday:** We will have one service on Maundy Thursday, April 18, beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Mary Elizabeth Bair Parish Center. Our Eucharist will be set in the context of

a simple meal of soup, salad, and bread and will include the foot washing ceremony. Following the service, we will process to the church to strip the altar in preparation for the Good Friday service.

**Good Friday:** On Good Friday, April 19, there will be only one service. At 12:00 noon, in the Church, we will have our Good Friday Liturgy with Proclamation of the Passion, the Great Prayers, Veneration of the Cross, and Communion from the Reserved Sacrament.

**Easter Sunday:** On Easter Sunday, April 21, we will have one Festival celebration of the Easter Eucharist at 9:00 a.m. in the church. On Easter Sunday, after the service, we will have our traditional Easter Egg Hunt for our young people which will begin at 10:15 a.m. in the Mary Elizabeth Bair Parish Center.

**Wednesday Morning Prayer and Healing Service:** Our Wednesday Morning Prayer and Healing Service is held in the Rector's Office at 9:30 a.m.

**Missed You Cards:** Father Patrick continues to send his weekly "Missed You Cards". Coming together each week is very important and we hope that you will make every effort to attend our Sunday Eucharist. Common Parish Family Prayer on a Saturday evening or Sunday morning is important every week.

**Use of St. Paul’s Facilities:** Please call the Parish Office if you want to reserve the Parish Hall or Church.

**Reminder:** Please remember that when you use the Parish Hall nothing can be put on the walls or the woodwork. Using scotch tape, duct tape, masking tape, and even some types of painter’s tape has the possibility of pulling the paint off the wall or damaging the surface. Items can only be placed on the wooden food bank cabinets or the metal kitchen window and its metal surround. Only masking tape or painter's tape can be used on these surfaces. This applies to both parish members and outside groups that use the hall and is clearly stated in the policy outlining use of the parish hall or the church. Thank you.

Egg orders may be picked up in the parish hall between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon Saturday and Sunday mornings
